DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

The U.S. Census Bureau estimated Grady County's population to be 57,375 in 2023, an increase of 4.7 percent from the 2020 Census.

90.6 percent of Grady County residents age 25 and over have graduated high school, slightly higher than the national and state average, but only 22.1% have a bachelor's or higher degree, well below the national average of 34.3% or state average of 27.3%.³

EMPLOYMENT PROFILE

Starting in April 2020, Grady County saw a sharp decline in total employment consistent with state and national trends but did not initially recover as quickly. However, since 2022, strong employment growth in the area has effectively offset the decline.




Fig. 1: Change in Total Employment from 12 months prior

The average monthly employment for the 12 months ending September 2023 was 13,286, comparable to the 2019 average of 13,276. Fig. 1 illustrates the percent difference in total employment between a given month and 12 months prior.⁴




Fig. 2: Unemployment Rates

Grady County unemployment has been consistent with state and national trends since 2020, and since 2021, has remained just below the state average. Grady County's unemployment rate as of April 2024 was 2.7%. Fig. 2 illustrates county, state, and national unemployment rates monthly since January 2020, not seasonally adjusted.⁵

WAGES & INCOME




Fig. 3: Change in wages from 12 months prior

The average annual wage in Grady County across all industries in 2022 was \$45,526, compared to \$53,992 in Oklahoma and \$69,986 in the United States. Fig. 3 shows average weekly wages for each quarter compared to a year before.⁵

The median household income in Grady County is well above the Oklahoma average and just below the national average, but the per capita income is much lower by comparison. (Grady County has a greater average household size than the state or nation.)

HOUSING & COST OF LIVING

The 2020 Census reported 23,024 housing units in Grady County. Esri estimates that an additional 1,004 units will be added by 2028, and that a greater proportion will be owner occupied rather than rented.

The median home value in Grady County is more than \$14,000 less than the state level. The county has a Housing Affordability Index of 163, meaning that a household making median wage can very easily obtain a mortgage for a home of median value.

Oklahoma had the lowest cost of living index of any state in 2023–86.2, or 13.8% below the national average.⁸ Oklahoma City had the lowest cost of living of all large cities in the United States in 2023, with an index of 85.1.⁹ Grady County falls within the Oklahoma City Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).

GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

Grady County's GDP in 2022 reached over \$3.3 million (in chained 2017 dollars), making it the 7th largest county by GDP. The growth from 2021 was the highest of any county in the state.
